PROPERTY NAME	St Bartholomew's Church and Cemetery

DESCRIPTION	St Bartholomew's is a simple rectangular brick Church with a tower, including a porch, a vestry and choir room. The walls are brick with plastered walls inside. There are timber floors and originally shingled roof and cedar joinery. The tower is a simple geometric shape with the brick being used for integral detailing. The cemetery is a formal cemetery with fairly simple headstones. The burial ground, where burials first took place in 1841, contains the tomb of Lieutenant William Lawson and graves of Lawson, Weston and Bettington families as well as many other local families.
HISTORICAL CONTEXT	Completed in 1841, St Bartholomew's is important from an historical and architectural viewpoint. It is one of few remaining buildings of pure Georgian character, has important associations with many notable pioneering families such as Lawson, Weston, Bettington and represents a community effort in the early colonial period to produce, without very skilled architectural aid, a building of Georgian character. The first burials in the cemetery took place in 1841. The grounds contain the tomb of Lieutenant W Lawson, one of the three explorers who made the first European crossing over the Blue Mountains. The site has significance to the Darug people as the burial site of Maria Locke and members of the Locke family. It also has great heritage landscape significance. CONCLUSION	St Bartholomew's has the potential to be the jewel in the crown of heritage in Blacktown. The building is highly
	visible and its care is symbolic of a growing awareness and valuing of cultural matters in the area. Any future use of
	the site should ensure a broad cross-section of people have relatively free and open access to the site. Use should be
	regular to allow removal of cyclone fencing from around the church. Site use should have a cultural focus with
	associated tourism opportunities. At the time of this revision of the draft report works had commenced to design a
	new facility and investigate the viability of the recommendations of the Masterplan.

RECOMMENDATIONS 1. Investigate acquisition of adjoining surplus RTA lands for parking facilities 2. Develop a report on possible cultural uses of the site that make specific recommendations 3. Utilise guidelines outlined in Masterplan in development of the site and update CMPs 4. Make landscaping a priority to encourage people to utilise and visit and develop landscape development and management plan 5. Encourage family care and community adopt-a-grave strategies 6. Investigate opportunities to illuminate site in a creative and attractive fashion 7. Develop and install site specific outside seating for visitors 8. Develop a tourist information board on site 9. Maintain a caretaker living on site indefinitely 10. Continue support and encouragement of cemetery tours 11. Establish a 'Friends' group for St Bartholomew's 12. Establish and develop St Bartholomew's Movable Heritage Collection
