Historical Association

Significance

The additions to the church were signed off by Cyrill Blackett who continued his father Edmund Blackett's significant church design practice into the late Victorian period. The memorials within the church are associated with significant founding settlers of the Riverstone district including John Schofields, after whom Schofields is named.

Criteria c)

Aesthetic/Technical Significance

St Paul's Anglican Church is a good example of a rural church with elements of the Victorian Gothic style as well as the associated visual marker for the Hoop Pine. It retains much of its original character and detailing including original brickwork, steeply pitched roof and narrow arched windows.

The relocated hall from Parklea is a typical example of an Edwardian church hall ind is highly intact.

Criteria d)

Social/Cultural Significance

St Paul's Anglican Church is of importance for its service to the local community since 1885.

Research Potential

The site may reveal the remains of an early rectory within the rear section of the property.

Physical Description Updated

Simple buttressed gothic style church constructed in brick and sandstone. An entrance porch is located at the western end. The church sanctuary was constructed c 1890 designed by Cyrill Blackett and the floor plans for this addition are displayed in the church.

The interior and exterior are significantly intact and representative of the Victorian gothic style.

The church contains memorial plaques including that of John Schofields, and Mr Vaughan, as well as dedicated stained glass windows.

The site also contains a small timber gabled framed church hall of c1900 construction including timber internal lining to the walls and coffer.

There is a mature Hoop Pine on the site possibly associated with a former rectory that no longer remains.

Other building's on the site include a substantial Brick church hall fronting Elizabeth Street (the largest building on the site) which was constructed in 1963, and a modern brick veneer church rectory on the hunter Street frontage.

The site runs through from Elizabeth Street to Hunter Street

Physical Condition Updated 12/10/2015

The brick church Building is in reasonable condition and highly intact. Some settlement cracking is occurring at the front and rear of the church.

The rear timber hall is in poor condition showing with interior linings loose and cracked.

Modifications And Dates

Church sanctuary added c 1890 - Cyrill Blackett.

C 1900 church hall moved to site prior to 1950's, and relocated within the site c 1960 for the construction of the main brick hall.

Main brick hall added to the site 1963.

Current rectory built c 1980's.

Historical Notes or Provenance

Updated

The foundation stone was laid on 12 November 1884 by Mrs James Richards. The first service was held on 7 March 1885.

In 1903 the vestry and chancel with stained glass windows of the saviour, St. Peter and St. Paul were added in memory of Arthur Faviell of Warrawong. The additions were designed by Arthur Blackett of Alneau Glen, Vineyard. They were also signed off by Cyrill Blackett, son of Edmund Blackett who continued his practice.

In 1911 the porch was added which housed the original bell from the Riverstone Farm. The bell had been donated by John Schofield.

In the 1950's the timber hall (c 1900 construction) was moved to the site from Parklea. It was moved again further into the site when the new church hall was built in 1963.
